Since the December 13, 2018 submission of the 2019 School Building Project Priority List, it has become necessary to request amendment of Table 1 to correct a reimbursement rate. A reimbursement rate of 78.93 percent was indicated for Bassick High School on Table 1, however, the reimbursement rate for this project is reduced from 78.93 percent to 68.93 percent as a result of being new construction.

<u>Category A**</u>: Create new facilities or alter existing facilities to provide for mandatory instructional programs pursuant to this chapter, for physical education facilities in compliance with Title IX of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1972 where such programs or such compliance cannot be provided within existing facilities or for the correction of code violations which cannot be reasonable addressed within existing program space;

<u>Category B</u>**: Create new facilities or alter existing facilities to enhance mandatory instructional programs pursuant to this chapter or provide comparable facilities among schools to all students at the same grade level or levels within the school district unless such project is otherwise explicitly included in another category pursuant to this section; and

<u>Category C</u>**: Create new facilities or alter existing facilities to provide supportive services, provided in no event shall such supportive services include swimming pools, auditoriums, outdoor athletic facilities, tennis courts, elementary school playgrounds, site improvement or garages or storage, parking or general recreation areas.

19DASY015180N0619, Bridgeport, Bassick High School

This project is for a new 220,000-square foot high school to replace the existing Bassick High School. The existing facility includes two buildings: the original high school built in 1929 and the second built in 1967. The existing 1929-era boilers, which serve the entire school, are well beyond their serviceable life. The existing buildings have maintenance issues and is too small to serve all Bassick academic programs, requiring some programs to be held off-site. The Culinary Program is one example of an off-site program. The new school will include state-of-the-art academic core classrooms, general education classrooms, specialized special education and life skills classrooms, student support services, freshman academy, media center, auditorium, standard and auxiliary gymnasia with team lockers, and finally a dining hall.

19DASY049140RN0619, Enfield, John F. Kennedy Middle School

The project will renovate and expand the existing middle school to serve an increasing enrollment and alleviate growing overcrowding. The original school, built in 1969, has a library addition built in 2000. All areas will be redesigned, reconfigured, and updated – all except the library addition. At project completion the existing portable classrooms will be eliminated. This project will modify the floor plan to provide spaces for an additional instructional team, one dedicated, special education classroom, new classrooms for speech and OT/PT, and include an Innovations Lab in each classroom wing. The new addition will be fully accessible with spaces for the auditorium and music rooms. The existing gym will be demolished to make way for a full-court gym with bleachers and two operable walls dividing the gym into four physical education classrooms. The final product will be fully sprinklered, air conditioned, and abated of hazardous materials.

19DASY103249ACV0619, Norwalk, Norwalk High School

This project will alter and expand the existing culinary arts program and upgrade all toilet rooms. Since Norwalk BOE evaluated and developed a "pathway" for the Hospitality Management/Culinary Arts program at the City's two high schools, there are more than 200 Norwalk High School students currently on a waiting list for the program. To accommodate the increased demand for the Hospitality Management/Culinary Arts program approximately 2,340 square feet will provide a hands-on experience with more cooking and lab/classroom space and a commercial kitchen with work stations for cooking preparation. The new program spaces will be accessible and code-compliant. Toilet room improvements will reconfigure the floor plans, replacing plumbing fixtures, and replacing light fixtures in repaired ceilings to make them code- and ADA-compliant spaces.

This project is the final phase of a 3-phase alteration to the middle school in the original 1957 building first constructed as a high school. This current phase will improve circulation spaces on the first floor consistent with improvements of the other two phases, abate hazardous materials from classrooms and re-design science classrooms, technology spaces, engineering classrooms, and family and consumer sciences instructional spaces. A new 7,555-square foot auditorium will provide a much-needed performance venue that can also be used as large group instruction/learning space. For the library media center, the addition of 5,770 square feet will centrally locate the Learning Commons for easy access for all students to engage in group collaboration, hands-on learning/study, and small group instruction.

Department of Administrative Services Report on Enrollment Projections

Pursuant to Section 10-283(a) (2), the list of proposed school construction projects submitted to the legislature for grant commitments shall include a report of the review conducted by the Commissioner of Administrative Services regarding the enrollment projections submitted for each eligible project. Each project requires an enrollment study that reflects the demographics of the entire district.

The enrollment studies are initially reviewed for compliance at the time of intake and to ensure compliance and accuracy as reflected in the district's application. The Director of the Office of School Construction Grants and Review requires studies to be current and conducted by an outside source specializing in the field. For each study, the Director of the Office of School Construction Grants and Review meets with the district to review the content of the study and validate assertions made by the district to ensure accuracy of the numbers to right-size the project before submitting the final listing to the Commissioner of Administrative Services for review and approval. All of the enrollment projections were determined to be acceptable to the Commissioner of Administrative Services. All required data has been submitted for each project and nothing remains outstanding. All projects are submitted in accordance with statutory and regulatory authority.
