How to Find a Job Teaching Music

Dear Prospective Music Teacher:

This is in response to your inquiry regarding music teaching positions in the state of Connecticut. If you have studied at a Connecticut university, your university placement service is usually a helpful source for job openings. If you are a member of the Connecticut Music Educators Association (CMEA) you are entitled to take advantage of the "jobs board" at the CMEA annual in-service conference (usually in March). For further information about the annual conference contact CMEA.

One important on-line source of job information is Connecticut Regional Applicant and Placement Program (CTREAP). Another source of openings is the Connecticut Education Association, which posts openings to the Internet. An alternate way for you to learn of positions is to send inquiries directly to school districts. Another way to learn of openings is to consult the classified ads in Connecticut's largest newspaper, <u>The Hartford Courant</u>, particularly the Sunday edition. If this paper is not available in your local library, call the Courant at (860) 525-5555.
